

Mrs. Rosa Hobbs Foster is a 1952 graduate of Peabody High School and a 1956 graduate of Virginia State College (now University). She was a long time resident of the Blandford community and a proud member of PHSNAA, Inc. Mrs. Foster was an elementary school teacher in the 60's and she later retired as principal from the Anchorage, Alaska school district. In April, the Ford Motor Company recognized twenty women as Alaska's Freedom Sisters. Mrs. Foster was one of the honorees who was recognized for her dedication to social causes and humanitarian efforts in the Anchorage community.

During Black History Month, Mrs. Foster was profiled in a feature on KTUU-TV, Channel 2 Alaska News. During that profile she said she believes the struggles are different for today's young people and she encourages them to know their history and where they come from. According to Mrs. Foster, "Black History Month highlights the errors and the triumphs of the past." In addition, Mrs. Foster said that she thinks about the contributions of the pioneers that paved the way for us. She believes that she would not be here today if it were not for those pioneers. She said, "We need to build on that."

Finally, Mrs. Foster said, "As we look to the future, it's not the color of skin that will make a difference, but it's what is in your heart."

The Fisher House Foundation provides "a home away from home" for military families to be close to a loved one at the most stressful time—during hospitalization for an illness, disease, or combat injury. Located in the close proximity of the medical center/hospital it serves, each Fisher House consists of between 8 to 21 suites with private bedrooms and baths. Families share a common kitchen, laundry facilities, spacious dining room and living room. The Fisher House Foundation assures there is no fee to stay in a Fisher House.

Alumni members contributed many non-perishable food items, water, paper products, cleaning supplies, gift cards to restaurants and gas stations. Those alumni who were out of town, or did not have the time to make purchases sent generous monetary donations to the cause. The boxes of items were presented on Friday, October 11, 2013 to the Fisher House Manager, Mr. Wayne Walker, by the Outreach Committee co-chairs, Harry Quarles (class of '52) and Virginia Barbour (class of '62). 




Burton S. Hayes, Jr., 1943 Peabody graduate

Afemo married his wife, Elisabeth Omilami, on September 11, 1985. She is an actress, minister and civil rights leader. They have two children, a son, Awodele and a daughter, Juanita.


Character Actor Afemo Omilami built a career out of portraying gritty, urban types in Hollywood features, often with an aggressive edge, e.g. cab drivers, longshoremen, barkeeps, drill sergeants and angry spouses. He made his TV debut in the 1979 TV movie "Freedom Road" and his movie debut in 1983's "Trading Places." He played in the TV series "In The Heat of the Night" as Jimmy Dawes (1989-1993). Other TV appearances include "Ghost Whisperer," "The Shield," "NYPD Blue," "Dawson's

Creek," "Law & Order" and "Miami Vice." He has appeared in many films such as "Glory" (1983); "The Firm" (1993); "Gordy" (1995); "Remember the Titans" (2000); "Drumline" (2002); "Ray" (2004); "Madeas's Family Reunion" (2006); "Hounddog" (2007) and "The Blind Side" (2009). He is perhaps best known for his role as the drill sergeant in "Forrest Gump" (1994). He was nominated for "Actor in a Television Movie, Mini-Series or Dramatic Special" in the 2013 NAACP Image Awards for his performance in Lifetime's "Steel Magnolias" as Drum Eatenton. Afemo is also co-director of "Hosea's Feed the Hungry and Homeless" a non-profit widely known for providing hot meals, haircuts, clothing and other services to the needy.

#### 50th Anniversary of the March on Washington

On August 28, 2013, citizens from across the country traveled to the nation's capitol to commemorate and celebrate the historic March on Washington, which occurred 50 years ago, August 28, 1963.



**Mrs. Bessie Moorer** (class of '45) can vividly remember the details of that day, 50 years ago, and she has been educating youth on the civil rights era since that time. "Remembering the Past and Moving Forward in the Future," Mrs. Moorer, with the assistance of concerned citizens, organized a bus trip for students and adults to witness the 50th Anniversary Celebration on August 28th. She has been taking students to D.C. to celebrate the March on Washington since 2000. "I just want them to see what we went through," she said. She further stated that the




celebrations brought her back to her first time on the National Mall. "It was emotional to me as it reminded me of the first one. There were a lot of young people, more than I expected. It was a sight to see, both races and people with young children," she said.



**Ms. Shirley Dexter** attended the March on Washington in 1963; however, she was not able to attend the 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Celebration. She recalls how she was still moved by listening to Dr. King's famous speech again on television. As a teenager, Ms. Dexter worked with the civil rights organization. She helped picket stores on Sycamore Street. She participated in sit-ins at W.T. Grant, J.C. Penney and the Trailways Bus terminal lunch counter. In the course of her work, Ms. Dexter had the chance to meet Dr. King in 1962. "He was a very approachable, humble man with a larger than life persona," Dexter said. She remembers being encouraged by leaders like Dr. King. Dexter indicated that she was somewhat disheartened when she went to jail. However, she felt that being jailed was a tactic of the movement. She recalled the 60's as a trying time, but said the determination of civil rights advocates brought change.

On August 28, 1963, more than 200,000 people listened as Rev. Martin Luther King, Jr. delivered his clarion call for justice "I Have a Dream" speech in front of the Lincoln Memorial. On August 28, 2013 (a half century to the hour), citizens gathered to hear the



nation's first Black President, Barack Obama, speak from the very spot that Dr. King delivered his speech; hailing the 50 years of racial progress that made his election possible, but warning Americans that Dr. King's dream remains unfulfilled.
