

Governor Terry McAuliffe Comes to Peabody Middle School




During a speech at Peabody Middle School on Monday, September 22, 2014, Governor Terry McAuliffe promised that he would have all of Virginia's schools fully accredited by the end of his term (3.5 years from now). He promised to make sure that every Virginia student is given a "world class education." For 2014-2015, the state has 10 unaccredited schools. "Enough TALK, enough PLANS, it's time to get to WORK. Our children deserve it," he said.

Governor McAuliffe praised the city's school division for the full accreditation of Petersburg High School, which was previously accredited with warning. He shared his goals to improve

Education across the state and to provide prepared workers for Virginia's economy, while closing the achievement gap between schools. He stressed the importance of widely available Pre-K education, improved standardized testing, community partnerships and grass root solutions to improve education.


In addition, he spoke of a recent poverty fighting initiative called the <u>Community Eligibility Program</u>, which provides free lunch and breakfast to all students in qualifying schools. "Poverty is the #1 predictor of academic performance," he said. "A child's zip code or their parent's financial condition should not determine a child's success in the Commonwealth." The Governor will be hosting an education summit on December 11th with the Virginia School Board Association and The Virginia Commonwealth University School of Education. The main purpose of the summit is to have public school officials share what has worked within their divisions to improve education and to identify solutions to instructional obstacles. The Governor said his doors are open for all suggestions. "We can work together and make it happen," he said. "We have a responsibility to our students."

Virginia Secretary of Education, Anne Holton, was onstage with Governor McAuliffe and addressed some of his education initiatives.

Peabodians Honored

The Alease Cooley Memorial Tent #718 of Petersburg, VA held its 4th Community Gems Breakfast Celebration on Saturday, August 2, 2014 at 9:00 a.m. at Shiloh Baptist Church in Chesterfield, VA; Rev. Marcus N. Leggett, Pastor.

Of the five honor recipients, two were Peabody Alumni. For outstanding and loyal service to the community and their church, which is Zion Baptist Church, Willis Brown, class of '61 and Joseph Lyons, Sr., class of '56 were honored as Community Gems. Words of confirmation, entitled "Men of Courage" were spoken by Rev. Dr. Andrew J. White, Sr. Family and friends of both honorees were in attendance to witness the celebration and offer congratulatory remarks.



Airborne Trooper, Ernest T. Shaw (class of '52), was honored at the 555th Parachute Infantry Association Convention in Nashville, TN on September 7, 2014. Former US Army 82nd Airborne Paratrooper Shaw was recognized and awarded the Airborne Paratrooper Excellence Award. This is the second time Mr. Shaw has received this award—the first in 2013 in Dallas, TX.

Mr. Ernest Shaw was the first Afro-American sportswriter for the Progress-Index from 1948 through 1964. In 1965, he became correspondent for the Baltimore Afro American Newspaper and the Norfolk Journal Guide Newspaper. In May 1961, he became the first African-American radio announcer on the air in Petersburg; Station WSSV. His on air name was "Mr. Clue." He continued his career through 1991.

A hallowed place within my heart is where you'll always stay.


God knows why, with chilling touch,

HISTORY LESSON FOR PEABODY MIDDLE SCHOOL STUDENTS

PHSNAA was asked to participate in Peabody Middle School's First Nine Week Intersession, which was held October 6-10, 2014. The theme for the 4-day session was "A Century of Black Life, History and Culture." The Association was excited to participate in the learning process of the middle school students and to educate them about the history of Peabody High School, from beginning to end. During day one, President Thelma Jefferson gave a detailed accounting of how Peabody High School was first organized; and 100 years later, how it was turned into a Jr. High School and, finally, a Middle School. She shared with students as much information as she could in the allotted timeframe—four sessions of approximately 30 minutes each. Also present to assist in sharing historical facts were Alumni members: Virginia Mann, Flossie Johnson-Ridley, Iris Brown, Janice Mann and Willis Brown. Mr. Ernest Shaw, a noted enthusiast in "sports history" shared the podium with Jefferson to educate the students about Peabody HS sports. To reinforce the history lesson, a table display of photos and old Peabody memorabilia was set up for the students to view.

Students also received an intriguing history lesson from Mr. Richard Stewart, owner of the "Pocahontas Island Black History Museum," representing the oldest Black community in America. His display of chains, whips, voodoo dolls and much more left the students and PMS faculty quite amazed.

Each student was given a copy of the original Peabody Building, the Peabody-Williams School, and the Peabody alma mater. A lesson in Black Life, History and Culture gave the students something to long remember and share with their family members.


