She graduated from Peabody High School; class of 1942. After graduation from Peabody, she attended North Carolina College (now North Carolina Central University) in Durham, North Carolina and received her B.S. degree. She served as an adjunct faculty member for two semesters after gradation.

Mrs. Jones was married to the late Albert W. Jones, who was head football and baseball coach at Peabody High School for many years. They had four children: Dr. Venus Jones (deceased), Albert W. Jones, III, Culbert Jones and Mrs. Vickie Whitties.

Mrs. Jones taught biology and chemistry and was senior class sponsor at Sussex County Training School from 1953-1957. She taught in several different Petersburg schools from 1945 until her retirement in 1986. Her students remember her as "the teacher who insisted that they learn."

Mrs. Jones is a member of the Virginia Avenue Retirees Group. She also served an eight-year term on the John Tyler Community College Board.

A fter retirement, Mrs. Jones began working in the Civil Rights Movement with hopes of improving conditions for many residents in Petersburg. She marched, picketed and protested until barriers were removed for minority citizens. She is a member of the First Baptist Church, Harrison Street, where she is a member and past president of the L.A. Black Circle.

Ernest "Mr. Clue" Shaw became the first Black sports writer for The Progress-Index Newspaper in 1948, and in 1961 the first Black sports announcer for WSSV Radio. Mr. Shaw is a graduate of Peabody High School, and went on to receive his B.S. degree from Virginia State College (now University). He worked for WSSV Radio and soon earned the nickname of "Mr. Clue" for the extensive research he put into his reports. He was voted one of the top 100 Disc Jockeys in the nation. In 1962, he appeared on the Dick Clark Show, in Philadelphia, PA with Smokey Robinson and Mary Wells. He has interviewed many sports figures such as Jim Brown and Jackie Robinson.

Mr. Clue is very active in the community. He is a member of Kappa Alpha Psi, the Prince Hall 12th Masonic District and Elks Royal Lodge IBPOE of W; former Vice President of the Petersburg Branch of the NAACP, former Vice-President of the Petersburg Branch of the SCLC, and a member of the 555th Airborne of Petersburg. In 1980, he received a Meritorious Award from Virginia State University, named the 1992 NAACP Man of the Year, and received the Civil Rights Community Service Award presented at First Baptist Church in 2008.



Mr. Shaw is a member of Trinity Baptist Church where he serves on the Board of Deacons. He was married to the late Vivian Shaw and they had two children, eight grandchildren and one great-grandson.
