By paying your membership dues:


- you are making a financial commitment to the Alumni Association;

The National Association of University Women "2014 Woman of the Year"

Yvonne Bethea Sims (Class of 1967) is a native of Petersburg, Virginia. She moved to Northampton County, North Carolina in 1997 where she resides in Jackson. She is the daughter of Thelma L. Bethea and the mother of LaMar and Lance Sims. She is the proud grandmother of Kendall, Lauryn, and Nathan Sims.

She was educated in the Petersburg Public School System. She received a Bachelor's degree in Biology, a Master's degree in Earth Science from Virginia State University, and her postgraduate certification in Earth and Environmental Science from Ohio State University. Mrs. Sims also worked nine years as a nurse for Columbia John Randolph Hospital area Medcare Clinic after receiving a degree in Medical Assisting from National Educational Centers.

Yvonne retired from the educational system after 40 years of service in teaching science and in administration: working in Dinwiddie County (VA), Petersburg (VA), Northampton County (NC), Bertie County (NC), Virtual High School, Virginia State University, and Fortis College Richmond. She has designed and presented 15+ professional staff development workshops in various school districts and science conferences in Virginia and North Carolina and in San Jose, California.

As Project Director of Partnerships to Enhance Student Achievement (PESA), a 2.9 million dollar National Science Foundation program, she was responsible for afternoon, Saturday, and summer programs in math, science and technology for the Roanoke Valley Consortium that serves the counties of Bertie, Hertford, Northampton, Warren and Weldon City schools. She has been blessed to receive several honors and awards for her work in education and the community, which include:

- Star Award, Teacher of the Year, Petersburg School Board

- Teacher of the Year (Northampton County High School-West and Northampton County High School-East)

Mrs. Sims was the first teacher to bring the UNC-Chapel Hill Destiny Bus-Traveling Science Lab to students in Biology at NCHS-East for two years and to involve students in their senior year in Human Anatomy Physiology at NCHS-West in work and study at Halifax Medical Center.

Sims is dedicated and active in service at St. Matthew AME Church in Weldon, NC where she is a member of the Steward Board, Usher Board and the Missionary Society. She works with the youth in the community, is an avid reader (two to three books a week), loves to play Bridge, and still tutors in Biology and teaches the occasional college class when needed.

When asked how she managed to stay in education for so long, her reply is, "Learning is a personal achievement that is gained through opportunity and a desire to succeed. Obtaining an education is easy if you simply want one. Learning is for a lifetime and is the 'Key to Success'; a success that is unlocked when communication turns the key."









Historical Treasures On Display

Historical treasurers of PHSNAA were on display in the gallery of the Siege Museum in downtown Petersburg throughout the month of March. A yearbook, megaphone and



numerous photographs from the 40's were included in the exhibit. Historian Iris Brown made sure the history facts were known. It was noted that the first school was developed in January 1870. Because space was inadequate at the old First Baptist Church on Harrison Street, land was purchased on the corner of Harrison and Fillmore streets for the erection of a new high school. The new school was completed in 1874 and Alfred Pryor was the first African-American to be appointed principal of Peabody High School in 1882. The rest is history..... How much of it do you remember?

If you have an opportunity, please go by and see the exhibit. The Seige Museum is open from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., Tuesday through Saturday and noon to 4 p.m. Sunday; closed Monday. Tours of the museum are: Adults \$5; Seniors and Children 12 and over - \$4. Children 7 and younger, and Petersburg residents are free.

LIFE MEMBERSHIP


Life membership status in PHSNAA is a category of membership available to all current members who meet the following requirements. To become a Life Member, an individual must

Four Peabodians were recognized for their outstanding work in the community.

Germaine Stewart Fauntleroy was one of five women recognized as "Ordinary Women Doing Extra Ordinary Things" at a celebration tea on Saturday, March 29th. Dr. Fauntleroy was born in Petersburg. Her accomplishments in the field of education are inclusive from the time of being Peabody HS Valedictorian of her senior class in 1952, to the outstanding achievement of retirement in 1996 after having given forty-one years of service. During her career, she has served in many capacities to include classroom teacher at all levels, Director of Student Services, Assistant Principal, High School Principal, Assistant Superintendent, and Superintendent of the Petersburg Public Schools. Dr. Fauntleroy continues to serve in board and leadership positions with many community organizations, to include the United Way, Alpha Kappa Alkpha Sorority, Inc., and the John Tyler Community College Board. Dr. Fauntleroy is an active member of Zion Baptist Church.

Bessie Moorer was one of the honorees presented with the Outstanding Community Service Award at the 33rd Annual Awards Banquet of the Civic and Progressive action Association of the Matoaca Magisterial District (CAPAAMMD) on May 16th in Jones Dining Hall at Virginia State University. Mrs. Bessie Moorer is recognized as a respected citizen of the community of Ettrick and a tireless civil rights activist. She is a native of Petersburg, a 1945 graduate of Peabody HS, and a retired instructional assistant. Mrs. Moorer became involved in politics at an early age and participated in many civil rights marches, voter registration activities and protests, including marches in Selma, Alabama. She has over 50 years in community service and activism, and has headed the county youth NAACP for many years. She is known as "The Community Queen of Lending a Helping Hand." She has been involved in numerous community and civic organizations. Mrs. Moorer is a devoted member of Gillfield Baptist Church.

Linda Williams Smith was honored by the Petersburg Alumnae Chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc. in the area of education at the annual May Week Celebration held on May 3, 2014. Linda conducted the sorority's summer reading program during the month of July. Ms. Smith is a native of Petersburg and a 1968 graduate of Peabody HS. She attended Howard University and George Mason University and received her B.A. degree in Elementary Education and her M.Ed. degree in Reading. In addition, she has been a public school teacher for 31+ years in Alexandria and Petersburg. Ms. Smith loves working with young children, which is evident by her continuous work in various reading programs. She is currently working with the Delta's annual summer reading program at Gillfield Baptist Church, July 9-31 from 10:30 a.m. – 12:30 p.m. She is an active member of Gillfield Baptist Church; founder and member of the Gospel Choir. 




Charles (Class of 1961) and Leatha Bethel

PHSNAA To Lease Original Building

Keeping in mind the mission statement of the Association, a request was made again to obtain possession of the original Peabody building located on Jones Street. The desire is to renovate the entire building into the Peabody High School Historical Museum. After meeting with City Manager, William Johnson and Councilman Howard Myers, who represents Ward 5, President Jefferson drafted a Request for a Lease Agreement, which was submitted to the City Council and defended in a Public Hearing on June 17, 2014. Jefferson presented council members with a small pamphlet entitled, "Bringing Life Back to Historic Peabody High School."

As she defended the request of the Association to lease the building, President Jefferson reminded council members of the main objective of the association when it was organized in the year 2000—that was to keep the legacy of Peabody High School alive. She said, "There is a lot of history in Peabody High School, which in 1971 became Peabody Middle School, and we want all Petersburg students and the entire community to now that history, and we do not want the residents of the City of Petersburg to forget that history. We want to make sure that the rich heritage trail of Peabody High School will be kept alive and will remain a viable landmark in the City of Petersburg."

Peabodians were in attendance in great numbers and stood in support of the Association's request to lease. The roll call vote was taken. All seven Council members supported the request. Jefferson will be meeting with the City's Preservation Planner to get assistance with funding agencies and proposal writing techniques to request grant money. Keep your ears open—you will be hearing more about the renovations and the Peabody High School Historical Museum.
